

A HISTORY OF IMPRESSIONISM - PART 2


They appeared during a period of upheaval. They saw the rebuilding of Paris, the rise of industrialism, the ruin of the Franco-Prussian war. They displayed their works—paintings that were startlingly, even shockingly new—in a series of exhibitions from 1874 to 1886. And by the 1890s this "loose coalition" of artists who rebelled against the formality of the French Academy had created the most famous artistic movement in history. "They" were the Impressionists. Join us as we continue our journey to learn about these artists, their art, and their times. Note: This study group was first presented in spring and summer 2008. This study group will carry over into the summer session with Part 3. This spring we will start in week 3 and meet the last 7 weeks of the session.

LEARN TO KNIT A SPECIAL GIFT

Every month nearly 300 babies are born at Northwest Community Hospital, and each baby is sent home with a hand knit (or crochet) hat, contributed by a volunteer. We use a very simple pattern. You can make hats in team colors, school colors, seasonal colors--any color except yellow. Be creative, have fun. Bring your questions and favorite patterns and techniques to share. If you do not know how to knit, we will teach you. After the term ends all the completed hats will be delivered to Northwest Community Hospital, and for each hat that you submit you will earn 4.0 hours of hospital volunteer credit. Our group has created over 76 hats since we started last summer! Bring one skein 3-ply yarn and one pair of size 6 OR 7 knitting needles.

THE RISE OF NAZI GERMANY

Six decades after its collapse, Nazi Germany continues to fascinate us. Though Adolf Hitler's state lasted only twelve years, it started history's most destructive war and committed one of history's most hideous crimes--the Holocaust. We will focus on the Nazi era from 1933 to 1939 and the rise of Adolf Hitler as dictator. However, to understand the era we will begin back in 1815 before there was a unified Germany. Topics to be covered include the origins of Germanic and National Socialist ideologies; the political history of Germany before, during and after the First World War; the life of Hitler; the collapse of Germany's democratic, liberal government, the Weimar Republic; the Nazi takeover of power; the Nazi revolution after taking power; the Nazi "synchronization" (Gleichschaltung) of all facets of German life to the goals of the party; and everyday life during the Nazi era. The study group will conclude with the beginning of WWII. Our format will include PowerPoint presentations, group discussions and DVDs, including *The Teaching Company: A History of Hitler's Empire*. This is a repeat of a study group offered in 2010. Note longer time period.
