LISTENING TO AND UNDERSTANDING OPERA Coordinators: Jack McKee and Henrietta Leary

Participants will have opportunities to share pictures at the sessions, as well as to take pictures during some hands-on activities.

DYNAMIC ACTING DUOS

What is this thing called charisma? Please join us as we learn about some of Hollywood's most famous acting duos. Each week we will watch a film featuring one of these duos and witness their on-screen chemistry. Many of these films received Academy Award nominations, or are listed with the American Film Institute or The Library of Congress National Film Preservation Board. Teams we will look at include Bogart & Bacall, Lancaster & Douglas, Matthau & Lemon, and Hepburn & Tracy. These charismatic pairs made memorable movies together and were interesting both on and off the screen. Did their chemistry transfer from the screen into real life, or was it simply great acting? **Note the longer time period.**

CLASSIC FILMS

Each week we will see a film and discuss various aspects of the film, including actors, directors, stories, music, etc. We will concentrate on "classic" films of the 30's, 40's, 50's, 60's and early 70's, when all the great Hollywood movie studios were in their heyday. Films are generally over 40 years old. Class members are encouraged to present favorite films from this era. Coordinators will provide assistance to presenters, if desired. Note the longer time requirement. We will meet for 8 weeks beginning the second week of the schedule.

We will explore the known, unknown, forgotten, surprising and amazing information about the years 1900 to 1999 in the good of USA – each session representing a decade. There will be scripts with power-point presentations, videos, quizzes, handouts and opportunities for participation. We'll have fun while learning much.

Join us as we continue to explore some of the many turning points in US history—landmark movements that altered the direction of the nation.
