FIRST LADIES INFLUENCE AND IMAGE: PART II Coordinators: Sue Gavigan, Jan Brietze and Sue Masterson

Join us for the continuation of our spring study group. We will discuss First Ladies not included in Part I and also women who represented a First Lady when the need arose.

Discover which First Lady was a professional dancer and which one never held a job or cooked a meal. We'll take an enjoyable and interactive behind-the-scenes look at the private lives and public roles of the First Ladies and the historical backdrop to their influence and image. **Note longer time period.**

ANTHROPOLOGY: THE EARLIEST TIMES Coordinator: George Gintowt

We are the only survivors of numerous hominid species. Starting with genetics and evolution, natural selection in the world of primates will be our focus. We'll examine the first hominids and the emergence of homo sapiens, stone tools, culture and the Paleolithic world. The use of video will bring some of the extinct hominids to life.

The eight operas of the Lyric Opera's 2013-2014 season will be presented in lecture format with audio highlights: *Otello, Madama Butterfly, Parsifal, La Traviata, Die Fledermaus, Rusalka, The Barber of Seville* and *La Clemenza di Tito*. Each opera will be discussed by a member of the Lyric's award-winning Education Corps. Note: this is an 8 week series beginning Monday, October 7; no lecture on Nov 18; final lecture on Dec 2. TUESDAY 9:00-11:30

CLASSIC FILMS

Join us in watching films that show Hollywood at its best. See movies

made when movies were movies and stars were bigger than life. We'll show films from the 30's to the 70's with names like Katharine Hepburn, Humphrey Bogart, Burt Lancaster, and Gloria Swanson. Each week we'll see a film and learn about the actors, the inside stories, the awards and the directors. Class members are encouraged to present a favorite film from this era with assistance from the coordinators. **Note longer time period. We will meet 6 weeks beginning Oct. 8.** ²







TUESDAY 9:30-11:30

MAJOR BATTLES OF THE CIVIL WAR, PART II **Coordinator: Tom Gavigan**

Join us for an in-depth look at the major battles of the American Civil War. Each week we will visit a different battle to learn about the circumstances surrounding it and examine in detail the tactical progression of the battle itself. We will cover, in order: Fredericksburg, Murfreesboro, Chancellorsville, Vicksburg. Gettysburg. Chickamauga. Chattanooga. Atlanta. and Petersburg-Richmond). If you are a military history buff, this is your opportunity to put some "stars on your shoulders" and offer an after-action assessment of the actual leaders and the tactics they employed.

MORE KNITTING AND CROCHETING **Coordinators: Meg Sculerati and Toni Gibson**

Here's the place for beginning and experienced knitters and crocheters to learn a new skill or add to one you already know. If you already know the basics, come to learn new stitches, pick a pattern, and get help with pattern reading. Beginners need to bring a size I, J, or K crochet hook or a pair of size 10 knitting needles; we'll supply practice yarn for the first session as well as directions for projects to make in time for the holidays. ORIENTAL BRUSH PAINTING Coordinator: Carolyn Simons

Learn the basics of the art of Oriental brush painting. Discover the "Four Gentlemen" of the ancient art of ink painting on rice paper. These sessions are for both new and returning students. Former students are welcome to attend the sessions as a workshop (bring your own supplies and equipment). First-time participants will pay a fee of \$30 for materials.

RECONSTRUCTION: 1863-1877 Coordinators: Tom Gavigan, Sue Harty and Harry Trumfio

The American Civil War not only ended slavery in America but also destroyed the social and economic fiber of the American South. How was the Nation to deal with the freedman? How was the Nation to rebuild the South? How was the Nation to deal with the former rebels? We will discuss the successes and the failures of these efforts and their impact that continues to this very day. For those who would like to further research this recommend Eric Foner's book: subject, we "RECONSTRUCTION: America's Unfinished Revolution, 1863-1867". We will be using Foner's work extensively in our presentations. This study group is a repeat from last Spring. Those wait-listed for the Spring session will be given priority in for this session.

Join us as we finish our exploration of some of the many turning points in the relatively short history of the United States—landmark movements that altered the direction of the nation. Whether they took the form of groundbreaking political and philosophical concepts, dramatic military victories and defeats, nationwide social and religious movements, or technological and scientific innovations, these and other turning points are the backbone of the American experience. They changed the character of America politically, socially, culturally, and economically. Note: we will meet the first 8 weeks of the fall schedule; note longer time period.
