THE ROOSEVELTS PART 2 Coordinators: Tom and Sue Gavigan

In part two of "The Roosevelts" we will be looking at the Hyde Park branch of the family. Our emphasis will be

on the lives and times of Franklin and Eleanor Roosevelt and their immediate family. We will examine the rise to power of these two extremely interesting, and to some, controversial people. We will discuss the Great Depression and the New Deal. The coming of the Second World War will bring us to a study of the Roosevelt presidential administration at war and in international politics. Along the way we will discuss their family issues, FDR's struggle with infantile paralysis and the inevitable comparison with the Oyster Bay Branch of the family that was covered in "The Roosevelts: Part One". Eleanor's active life after Franklin's death will also be examined. Please join us for this continuation of our study of the amazing Roosevelt family. **Note longer time period.**

In strictly layperson's terms, we will learn to enjoy this music without being too technical. We will use a "down-toearth" approach. Not for musicologists. We will hear, and sometimes see, many musical examples. Note: maximum participants: 30. We will meet for eight weeks beginning Sept. 21.

DYNAMIC DOCUMENTARIES **Coordinator: Kathie Newsted**



Presentations will include background information on each.

SHAKESPEARE'S TRAGEDIES, COMEDIES & HISTORIES—OH MY!

If you love Shakespeare or are eager to learn about his plays, this class is for you! After we read each play, we will watch a DVD version. Please supply your own copy of each play. The *No Fear Series* is recommended for *Richard III*. This study group will look at the life and music of Ludwig van Beethoven, one of the great masters of classical music. We will take full advantage of Professor Robert Greenberg's wonderful lectures from the Teaching Company, as well as other video and lecture material. While we listen to and study his music, we will also attempt to better understand life in early 19th century Vienna. **Note: we will meet the first five weeks only.**

We will select some winners among the six Nobel categories and discuss their biographies and accomplishments.


A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE WORLD Coordinators: Henrietta Leary and Mary Svetlik
