#### PRACTICAL PROBABILITY

Every day we're exposed to statistics intended to inform or persuade us--a 30% chance of rain, how lifestyle choices affect longevity, opinion poll results, etc. To better evaluate such information we'll explore the principles and methods of probability and statistical reasoning. We'll use videos--designed for non-mathematicians--along with lecture and discussion segments. Useful and entertaining topics include the nature of randomness, game theory, random walks, gambling, genetic drift, weather forecasting, misuse of statistics and counterintuitive cases in probability. **Maximum participants: 25; minimum: 15.** 





# BUDDHISM AND CHRISTIANITY Coordinator: Gene Ahern

We will examine aspects of Buddhism and how it relates to Christian belief and practice. Lectures, discussion and DVDs will include the role of meditation in these religions. Your coordinator has advanced degrees in theology and classical languages. **Note that we will meet only during the first six weeks of the fall schedule.**

### WHO WROTE THE "WHO DONE ITS"?



Join us as we watch each director's films on alternate weeks, starting with Mel Brooks' *Blazing Saddles*, followed by Albert Brooks' *Lost in America*. These and two of our other films appear on lists of the 100 funniest comedies of all time! **Minimum participants: 10.** 



# **EXPLORING SHAKESPEARE'S LESSER-KNOWN PLAYS Coordinators: Mary Ann Mroz and Kathryn Dublinski**

We will be reading aloud two of Shakespeare's lesser known plays. *Timons of Athens* is a tragedy about flattery, misanthropy and hypocrisy. *Measure For Measure* is a dark comedy in which a politician gets caught in a sex scandal. (Some things never change.) After reading each play, we will watch and discuss the BBC version on DVD. **Note: Attendees should buy their own copies of these plays before the first session. We recommend the Folgers series. Maximum participants: 15; minimum: 10.**

#### **CURRENT EVENTS**

Participate in lively, stimulating and provocative discussions of current events. With Republicans controlling the House, what's the future for the Obama agenda and 2012 prospects? All Democrats, Republicans and Independents are welcome! **Minimum participants: 15.** 

### THE HISTORY OF THE SUPREME COURT Coordinator: Les Miller

This study group will cover the history of the Supreme Court dating from revolutionary times. We will use the Teaching Company course by Professor Peter Irons, which covers developments through 2000. The coordinator will present addition historical information and developments since 2000, and we'll discuss current legal issues of interest to participants. The fall session will cover developments until the end of World War II. Later developments will be covered in the winter and spring sessions. Participants may take individual sessions even if they will not be able to participate in all three.


