










Online registration on the ICLRU website begins February 1, 2013. Also on this date, the ICLRU Center will begin processing registration forms that have been mailed in or delivered in person.

#### **PLAY READING**


**Coordinators: Pamela and Steve Novey**


## MINDPLAY – EXPLORE THE CONSCIOUSNESS UNIVERSE THEORY






## "LOOK WHAT THEY'VE DONE TO MY HYMN, MA" Coordinators: Gordon Palmer and Vivian Palmer




