THE ROOSEVELTS: PART I Coordinators: Tom and Sue Gavigan

In part one, we will be looking at the Oyster Bay branch of the family. Our emphasis will be on the life and times of Theodore and Edith Roosevelt and their immediate family. Through lectures, audio-visuals and discussion we will try to keep up with the tirelessly exuberant "Teddy" and his extraordinary family. We will journey back to the "Gilded Age," the rise of progressives, "Muckrakers," "Trustbusters" and the age of American imperialism. Films for weeks 4 through 9 will be determined by the participants with help from your coordinator. To date, Nicholson has been nominated 12 times for an Academy Award and has won 3 Oscars. He is one of two male actors to have been nominated in 5 consecutive decades beginning in the 60's. **Note longer time period.**

Each person has his or her own thoughts about God and religion. At some point in our lives, most of us have probably asked questions such as: Is there a God? Did God create man or did man create God? Does God answer our prayers? What happens to us when we die? Why are there so many different religious beliefs? Yet in most social situations we are discouraged from discussing these topics. This session employs mixed media and interactive discussion to chronicle major events in the lives of our 44 presidents. Part 1 covered the period from 1789-1865, George Washington to Abraham Lincoln. Part 2 deals with 1865-2013, Andrew Johnson to Barack Obama. The material gathers vivid snapshots of all 44 Commanders in Chief and analyzes their powerful personalities, weaknesses, and major achievements. The American Presidents features rare and unseen photographs and footage, as well as valuable insights from journalists, scholars, and politicians. **Note: We will meet the first 8 weeks only.**

HEROES OF LEGEND
