

What is a piano concerto? How/why is it different from a symphony or a sonata? How has the piano evolved and changed to become






Tuesday 9:00-11:30

The second play is *Love's Labor's Lost*, an unusual comedy which deals with the battle of the sexes, Elizabethan style, showing different attitudes toward love—something to be denied, tested or exalted.
