This study group will start with instruction and practice in basic proportions of the head. We will then progress to practice drawing the body from photographs and finally drawing from models. Thursday 9:30-11:30 SOME MYSTERIES OF THE WORLD Margo Temple and Bob Long, Coordinators




Thursday 1:00-3:00

ROBERT E. LEE AND THE CONFEDERATE STATES OF AMERICA Tom Gavigan and Sue Harty, Coordinators


