

ALL THE DIFFERENT ASPECTS OF AIRLINE FLYING TODAY Coordinators: Bob Bos and George Venetis



Many people aspire to become airline pilots. This is a very exciting and rewarding profession. The requirements are quite challenging, however. We will discuss what's required for the major airlines today, and what kind of training is involved. Review of the passenger safety card, as well as evacuation procedures will be presented in addition to where the safest passenger seats are located in the aircraft. A three-part episode called "The City in The Sky" will be shown indicating the three sequences of a typical airline flight. We will talk about the "Planes that Changed the World." Some of Captain Bos' own experiences flying the line will also be discussed. Three of the world's worst Airline Disasters, including the Chicago O'Hare DC-10 accident of 1979, will be shown, as well as a number of other disasters. We will analyze and discuss the reasons for these accidents. Finally, the latest information will be given on the two accidents involving the B737Max 8.


PLATO'S PLACE




