



MONDAY 9:30-11:30

A HISTORY OF IMPRESSIONISM – PART 1 Bob and Sue Masterson, coordinators

They appeared during a period of upheaval. They saw the rebuilding of Paris, the rise of industrialism, the ruin of the Franco-Prussian war.



They displayed their works—paintings that were startlingly, even shockingly, new—in a series of exhibitions from 1874 to 1886. And by the 1890s this "loose coalition" of artists who rebelled against the formality of the French Academy had created the most famous artistic movement in history. "They" were the Impressionists. Join us as we learn about these artists, their art, and their times. NOTE: This was first presented in Spring and Summer 2008. This study group will carry over into the Spring 2015 session. We will meet the first 4 weeks.

The coordinators have visited these countries four times in the last ten years and believe that a better understanding of culture and history makes the travel experience all the richer! ARTISTIC LICENSE: TALES OF ART AND ARTISTS Charlotte Willour and Darlene Brill, coordinators



The mockumentary film genre reached mainstream audiences first with director Rob Reiner's brilliant but fictional documentary about a British rock band called Spinal Tap. The appeal of a mockumentary lies in the alternative universe it creates. The audience knows the work as a whole is fictional, but there is little of the standard set-up and punch line formula found in traditional comedies. The humor often arises from incidental bits of dialogue or visuals, accompanied by an actor's deadpan delivery of improvised lines. We will view and discuss the funniest comedy films of the genre, directed by Christopher Guest, Woody Allen, and Eric Idle. **Note longer time period.**
