The 'Brief History of the World' study group was just that--way too brief to cover it all. So in these sessions we will take a look at some of the colorful characters and events in world history that we had to rush through during the fall 2016 classes. Topics such as the Papacy and the Reformation, Lucretia Borgia and the Medici family, African history and the diamond empire, the history of India including the British occupation and the 1947 India/Pakistan partition, and from Russian history, the Romanovs. The format will be mostly video. **Maximum participants: 50**.

During a film career of almost 30 years, Humphrey Bogart appeared in more than 75 feature films. In 1999, the American Film Institute ranked Humphrey Bogart as the greatest male star of classic American cinema. Over his career, he received three Academy Award nominations for Best Actor, winning one for *The African Queen*. Each week we'll cover a chronological biography of Mr. Bogart and view one of his memorable films. **Note longer time period**.

Kicking off "The Year of Eleanor Roosevelt" we will be watching the Ken Burns films *The Roosevelts--An Intimate History*, with discussion as time permits. This is a film series that goes into the lives of both Eleanor and Franklin.

#### WORLD WAR I Coordinator: Les Miller



World War I was one of the most significant events in world history. It caused significant changes from the 19th Century world order and created many aspects of the world in which we live. This study group will primarily examine the causes of the war and its impact on the postwar world and only secondarily on the conduct of the war. We will use a combination of Great Courses and other video materials as well as presentations by the coordinator.

Examples of our topics include Handel's *Water Music,* Beethoven's *Wellington's Victory* and Chopin's *Revolutionary Etude.* Note: we will meet the first four weeks.

#### DOWNTON ABBEY (PART 2) Coordinator: Kathleen Miller



Perspectives on early Twentieth Century Britain: Between 1917 and 1920, the characters in *Downton Abbey* moved through a tumultuous time in history. These particular episodes highlight a number of moral issues within a social, political, and cultural context. In order to finish Season 2, we will watch seven episodes of the series (hence the longer time). The coordinator will provide some context, and suggest topics for discussion. If you did not attend part I, please watch Season 1 and the first two episodes of Season 2 before the first session. **Note** 4 **longer time period.**
