MYTHS AND MYSTERIES OF THE 20TH CENTURY Tom Dooley and Earl Arnold, coordinators



As far as the human body is concerned, all pharmaceuticals are foreign substances that can have both beneficial and deleterious effects. Balancing the risk/reward ratio can be tricky. The purpose of the course is to convince the participants of the foregoing statements by a historical review of experience and to give suggestions for ways to maximize the benefits of prescribed and OTC drugs and minimize the risks due to errors by the user. The history of the Food and Drug Administration and its response to both adverse drug reaction problems and unethical marketing activities by pharmaceutical companies will be discussed. **Minimum participants: 8.**


