

A HISTORY OF EUROPEAN ART Coordinators: Gene Flynn and Alan Johnson

During a film career of almost 30 years, Humphrey Bogart appeared in more than 75 feature films. In 1999, the American Film Institute ranked Humphrey Bogart as the greatest male star of Classic American Cinema, and Bogart still ranks as the #1 or #2 best actor of all time on many polls. Over his career, he received three Academy Award nominations for Best Actor, winning one for *The African Queen*. Over the course of five weeks I will present a chronological biography of Mr. Bogart and we will watch some of his memorable films.

UNDERSTANDING THE HISTORY AND SPECULATING ON THE FUTURE OF "THE OTHER EUROPE" Coordinators: Mike and Marilyn Glass

Part 2 continues an in-depth analysis of Eastern Europe, covering the years 1918–1953, the period when the continent emerged from World War I's carnage and dislocation to become an even more complicated region. Beginning with the Paris Peace Conference, we journey for 35 more grueling and demanding years to witness the Cold War becoming a fact of life in the Eastern Bloc. By 1953, when Stalin dies, only Finland, Austria, and Yugoslavia are not under communist rule. **NOTE: THIS STUDY GROUP MEETS THREE TIMES, THE FIRST CLASS STARTING ON FEBRUARY 6.** Part 3, the final segment of five weeks, will be offered in Summer 2020.
