





POPES AND THE PAPACY: A HISTORY - ZOOM ONLY



Program Description



Program Description

The award winning 1970s TV series, The Ascent of Man, "peels back layers of history, invention, science and archeology to investigate the 'great paradox of the human species." In Part 1 we explored the revolutionary changes that gave rise to humanity, the agricultural revolution, and mankind as architect and builder. We followed with the discovery and elaboration of chemistry and mathematics, ending the study group with a discussion of the conflicts between fact and faith in developing a cosmology.

Part 2 continues our journey as we explore the contributions of Newton and Einstein and discuss the effects of the Industrial Revolution on modern life. The series continues up the ladder of creation from evolution to the discovery of the atom. Human development and the complex code of human inheritance are assessed. In closing the many facets studied will be evaluated as a whole, while future challenges to our ascent discussed.


