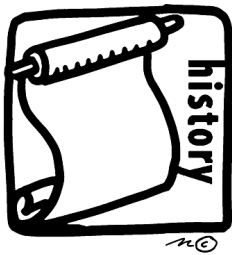
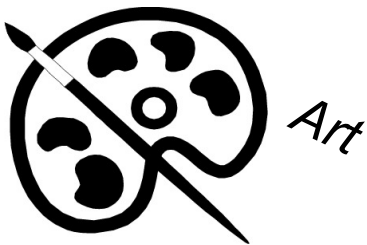

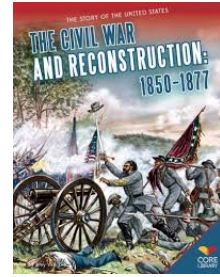
MONDAYS 1:00-3:00

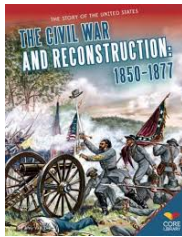

Note: This study group is planned to continue through successive Fall and Spring sessions.

We will be looking in depth at the Civil War and Reconstruction from a military, political, societal, and economic perspective. These continuing sessions will include many stand-alone topics covering people, political viewpoints and “moral” viewpoints of this period in American history. The military aspects of the conflict will be covered in considerable detail.

In this initial nine weeks, the focus of our discussion will be on the period leading up to the Civil War. Along with many other topics, we will cover the socio-economic differences between the sections of the nation that were evident even at the time of the earliest colonial settlements and how and why these differences grew even greater over time. We will look at the arguments over slavery versus free labor; the “right” of secession; the compromises enacted in an attempt to avoid the conflict; the formation of the confederacy and its constitution; and the people who were important to this period. Time permitting, we will discuss the earliest days of the war itself.

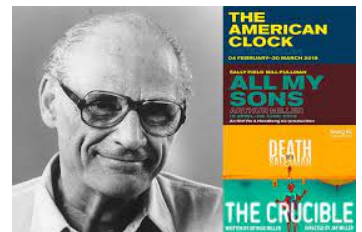

THE HISTORY OF UKRAINE

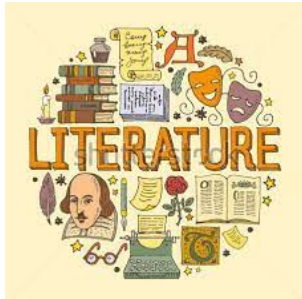

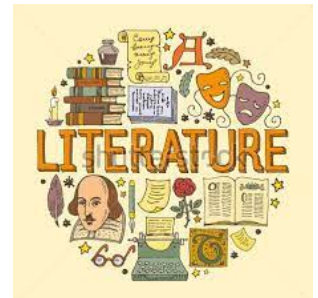

THE FRENCH REVOLUTION

The French Revolution had its roots in a century's old system of government that had never worked for the majority of the citizens. All the benefits of wealth and power were concentrated first in the King and then in the Church and the Nobility. By the late 1790's the government's economic bankruptcy and need for money came up against a growing middle class that demanded personal freedom and the right to effectively participate in the government. Once the conflict began, the peasant class added its grievances to the quest for freedom. The clash between these groups and the unwillingness to compromise led to a bloody revolution and repeated changes to the government system that lasted over 100 years. This 4 week study group will cover the history of France and the revolution that eventually led to significant changes to the map of Europe.
