


The purpose of this class is to introduce the art and science of mosaics. Students will design and work on a single project using precut glass while learning how to prepare, design and complete a finished project.



Guest speaker, Ed Spire, will provide information related to the ongoing discussion about tighter regulations on assault weapons like the AR-15. If we are going to regulate these weapons, we will need a legal definition describing them. And instead of a definition that depends upon specific configurations or cosmetic appearance, we propose a definition based on the factors that make this class of weapons so deadly.

This presentation focuses on the development of this class of weapons, the factors that make them so deadly, and how we can use those factors to legally define an "assault weapon" for future regulation thereof.



Hiroshima by John Hersey: Book Discussion (An ICL Reads Program)

In August 1945 President Harry Truman ordered the use of the atomic bomb. Stories and newsreels provided details of the attacks: the numbers wounded and dead, the staggering estimated costs—numerically and culturally—of property lost, and some of the visual horrors. Journalist John Hersey's August 31, 1946 New Yorker article "Hiroshima" focused instead on the human toll of the bombs and the individual stories of six survivors of the nuclear attack on Hiroshima rather than on statistics. It forever changed how Americans viewed the atomic attack on Japan. In 1999, it was voted the greatest piece of American journalism of the 20th century. It remains relevant today and as a book, it has never been out of print.

Participants will be expected to read the original book which is approximately 100 pages, depending on the edition, and be prepared to discuss it. The Aftermath, added in 1985, is optional reading. Copies of *HIROSHIMA* can be obtained from local libraries in Regular Print, Ebook, and Audio CD formats or purchased from book stores.

When Harry S. Truman was sworn in as president on April 12, 1945, the firebombing of Japan and the battle for Okinawa were in progress. The horrendous casualties, both military and civilian, suffered by the Japanese would not convince them to surrender. It became obvious to the new president that they would rather die, even by their own hand, than surrender. This, coupled with the heavy casualties suffered by the Allies in capturing Okinawa, would go a long way to convince the new president that he must use the newly developed atomic bomb to avoid the enormous casualties an invasion of Japan would entail.
